Isaiah: The Lord Saves, Part 8 "The Servant of the Lord" | Isaiah 49-55 Pastor Andrew Jun

Be confident that God solves the issue of our sin through his Servant.

I. God's Commitment (49:1-52:12) God is deeply committed to his people.

- See Isaiah 49:1-6. "Servant of the Lord" would not just bring Israel back to Jerusalem but would bring God's salvation to the ends of the earth.
- See Isaiah 49:14. Three types of exiles: 1) "God is treating us unfairly," 2) "God is giving us what we deserve," 3) "Who cares? This is a hopeless situation" (Oswalt).
- See Isaiah 49:15-16. Two illustrations: "Can a mother forget her nursing baby?" and "I have engraved you on the palms of my hands."

II. God's Sacrifice (52:13-53:12) God provides a timeless sacrifice for his people.

- See Isaiah 53:3-4. People saw what they hated in the "Servant of the Lord." He was despised and rejected, afflicted and accursed by God.
- See Isaiah 53:5-6. Substitution: "He was wounded for our transgression, crushed for our iniquities." See Leviticus 16. Atonement: The forgiving or pardoning of sin.

- See Isaiah 53:10-11. Justification: The Servant of the Lord would "make many to be accounted righteous." See John 19:30, Matthew 24:37.
- We need to see our need to be saved from our sin, our need for a substitute, atoning sacrifice.

III. God's Invitation (54:1-55:13)

God invites us into fellowship and service with Him.

- See Isaiah 55:1-2. God invited the "thirsty" to come to the waters and drink and the "poor" to buy wine and milk without money– feasting and fellowship with God.
- See Isaiah 55:3. God invited them into an "everlasting covenant" with himself, as David did. See Psalm 23:5-6.
- See Isaiah 55:4-5. God invited them to be a "witness" and a "leader" to the peoples. See Acts 13:36, Isaiah 54:1-3 & 55:10-11.

⇒ Life Application:

- 1. Trust that Jesus is your substitute, atoning sacrifice.
- 2. Feast and fellowship with God: Word, prayer, worship.
- 3. Believe who you are in Christ: a witness and leader.
